

WHAT WE DO



SHELTER

Every year, Mosaic House provides safe haven to hundreds of women and children fleeing domestic violence and human trafficking.



COUNSELING

Survivors of trauma find hope and healing through counseling, child play therapy, art therapy, and support groups.



CLIENT ADVOCACY

Advocates work with clients in their native languages, helping them access vital support services and resources within the community.



LEGAL REPRESENTATION

Staff attorneys help survivors access justice by providing representation for divorce, custody, child support, and immigration matters.



COMMUNITY EDUCATION

To build healthier, stronger families and communities, our team provides education on issues that impact refugee and immigrant communities, including human trafficking, domestic violence, life skills for youth substance abuse prevention, and more.

WHO WE SERVE

Mosaic supports, educates, and empowers the multicultural communities of North Texas. Through comprehensive social services and educational programs, we create access to opportunities for survivors of human rights abuses and equip youth with skills to become leaders in their own diverse communities.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SURVIVORS

Domestic violence affects people of all backgrounds, but women and children within immigrant communities are exceptionally vulnerable to abuse. Many of our clients come from countries with no laws (or enforcement) against domestic violence and may face additional barriers to leaving violent relationships.

TRAFFICKING SURVIVORS

Human trafficking is modern slavery, widespread around the world, including here in North Texas. Mosaic has served hundreds of women, men, and children who found freedom after being exploited and controlled through force, fraud, or coercion.

REFUGEES

A refugee is a person who has been forced to flee his or her country due to war, persecution, or violence because of their race, religion, nationality, or political group. Ethnic, tribal, and religious violence/war are leading causes of refugees fleeing their countries.

10,000 Each year, Texas resettles approximately 10,000 refugees, who arrive fleeing unrest.

1 IN 4 In the U.S. and around the world, 1 in 4 women will experience domestic violence in her lifetime.

27 MILLION An estimated 27 million people worldwide are held in slavery today.
