OUR TEAM

Mosaic was founded in 1993 by Dr. Walter Nguyen, a former refugee who escaped an oppressive regime in Vietnam in 1982 and has dedicated the past 21 years to helping survivors of human rights abuses build new lives. Our staff comes from around the world, speaks 25 languages, and represents dozens of cultures and every major faith. Our work together is a celebration of diversity every day.

OUR CLIENTS

Like our staff, the women, men, and children we serve come from all over the world. Some of them arrived in the United States fleeing brutal war & persecution, others seeking to build better lives for their children and themselves. All have had their freedom threatened, whether by war, modern-day slavery, or violence in their own homes. They are testimonies to the courage and resilience of the human spirit.

OUR SUPPORTERS

Our volunteers and donors believe in the idea that **freedom is a human right**. They stand up for that idea every day by giving of their time and resources to ensure that survivors of human rights abuses in our community have opportunities they need to build new lives of freedom and hope. Our supporters truly make everything we do possible.

OUR VISION

We are dedicated to serving survivors of human rights abuses from around the world and within our community. We create access to opportunities for our clients, empowering them toward independence. We hope to equip future leaders with the skills to impact their own diverse communities for a stronger, more vibrant North Texas.

Founded in 1993, Mosaic is a safe haven for survivors of human rights abuses, including human trafficking and domestic violence. Mosaic creates access to opportunities for survivors empowering them toward independence. With a multicultural staff and comprehensive services, Mosaic reaches over 15,000 people annually.

Our clients' needs are met in one safe place: they receive free shelter, legal representation, counseling, education and support services in more than 25 languages.

Our mission is to support, educate and empower the individuals and families of the multicultural communities we serve.



CLIENT ADVOCACY

Multilingual client advocates who function as interpreters and advocates work with recently arrived refugees, survivors of family violence and survivors of human trafficking to identify their needs and access vital services and resources within the community. Mosaic staff is fluent in over 25 languages, enabling them to serve as a cultural bridge. Client advocacy gives survivors the tools they need to become self-sufficient.

SHELTER

Mosaic House is our shelter for women and children who have survived family violence or human trafficking. Residents receive the basic necessities including food, clothing, hygiene items and medical care, while building the tools needed to be healthy and independent through on-site ESL classes, job and life skills training, counseling and parenting courses. Children at the shelter receive help with school enrollment, immunizations, life skills, health care, tutoring and more.

Mosaic House was home to 198 women & children fleeing violence this year.

I am a survivor of domestic violence. Mosaic Family gave me and my son all the support and love during our stay at the shelter. We are now living a happy life free from violence. Thank you "Mosaic Family" for support us and giving us strength to start not just ours, but many more lives.





LEGAL REPRESENTATION

Survivors come to Mosaic with legal needs encompassing both immigration and family law. They may need protective orders to keep them safe from their abusers, as well as representation for divorce, custody and child support matters. Our attorneys help with these services, as well as immigration applications including U Visas, T Visas and VAWA self-petitions. Our highly trained legal team collaborates with law schools, firms and pro bono attorneys to amplify our impact in the North Texas community and help more survivors access justice.

COUNSELING

Bilingual counselors utilize the Multicultural Counseling Model to assist refugees, immigrants and survivors of family violence and human trafficking in overcoming trauma and improving their emotional well-being.

In 2014, **396** people found hope and healing through our counseling program.



COLLABORATION & COMMUNITY EDUCATION

In addition to providing direct services to survivors, our team provides educational outreach to build healthier, stronger families and communities. Our goal is to help stop human rights abuses in North Texas and beyond.

Mosaic's model of comprehensive, culturally sensitive services is nationally recognized. Our participation as an active member of local, regional and national coalitions, task forces and networks helps us build strong partnerships and inform policies intended to fight human rights abuses.

In 2014, our Multicultural Youth Substance Abuse Prevention Program provided life skills classes and education on substance abuse prevention to **5,306** culturally diverse students and their families in Dallas County.

Our Human Trafficking Outreach Program provided education on human trafficking to more than 13,000 community members, including more than 2,000 law enforcement officers & social service providers. Nearly 10,000 educational outreach materials were distributed throughout North Texas.



FREEDOM NETWORK USA

The Freedom Network USA is a national alliance of experienced advocates working with survivors of all forms of human trafficking to ensure that trafficked persons have access to justice, safety and opportunity.

As part of our involvement of working to uncover cases of human trafficking, serve those who have been trafficked, bring awareness to the public, and work to end this crime, Mosaic Family Services is the fiscal agent for the Freedom Network USA. The Freedom Network USA is a national coalition of nearly forty agencies working with persons who are survivors of human trafficking. Mosaic's Deputy Director, Bill Bernstein, served as co-chair of the Freedom Network USA for seven years, the longest serving co-chair.

NEW MOSAIC HOUSE

Every year, we work with hundreds of women who have left abusive relationships against incredible odds or fled exploitation so that they can give their children safe, loving homes. These women are often from cultures where domestic violence and other forms of abuse are condoned, and standing against it can sometimes mean losing their home, belongings, friends and family. Sometimes arriving at our doors with nothing in hand but their children, these strong, brave women come to build new lives.

In August 2014, Mosaic House moved to a new facility that expanded our capacity and provides a more welcoming space for women and children fleeing human rights abuses. Our new campus includes spacious offices, a large outdoor play area, a tranquility garden, a resource room, two kitchens, a play and art therapy room and a beautiful, light-filled living space for up to 46 residents.

Many thanks to the outpouring support from all our volunteers and donors for helping us make this shelter transition possible. The generous spirit of the North Texas community was revealed, as hundreds of people gave thousands of hours painting, decorating, hosting fundraisers and so much more.

EVENTS

Celebrating an inaugural event, **The Fashion for Freedom Luncheon**, hosted by Al Biernat, helped Mosaic continue to meet the ever increasing need for services for survivors of human trafficking. On May 2, over 175 guests joined us at Al Biernat's for a decadent three-course meal, Mosaic Martinis and two fashion shows featuring Abi Ferrin and Juliette Longuet.

We had a memorable afternoon listening to remarks by Mayor Mike Rawlings, and community philanthropist, Jan Rees-Jones. Abi Ferrin and Juliette Longuet, showcased their new spring fashion designs and each guest took home a complimentary spa service courtesy of ESPA at The Joule.

The Fashion for Freedom Luncheon benefits our work with victims of trafficking. The luncheon helped expand our shelter's capacity to continue serving survivors of labor and sex trafficking in the Dallas community. We are incredibly grateful for the support we received at this event.









EVENTS

This year, over 350 guests joined us at the Fashion Industry Gallery for our 5th Annual Champion of Human Rights Gala to honor Abi Ferrin, fashion designer & anti-trafficking activist. Abi helps create alternate forms of employment and hope for oppressed and trafficked women worldwide. Abi is also founder of The Freedom Project, which supports saving women from abusive employment and sex trafficking.

We had a memorable night listening to the Hunter Sullivan Band and our emcee, Amy Vanderoef, hearing from a Mosaic survivor of domestic violence, and honoring Abi Ferrin as this year's Champion of Human Rights. Guests enjoyed hors d'oeuvres, cocktails and a unique shopping experience; they also bid on exciting auction items.

The gala benefits our work with survivors of domestic violence and human trafficking and makes it possible for us to continue advancing our vision of combating human rights abuses in North Texas. We are so grateful for the support we receive at this event each year.




